Department News

Our school district continues to embrace the Aboriginal Education Agreement Goals in schools: academic achievement, sense of belonging, Aboriginal ways of knowing and Aboriginal languages. Daily, I see more and more examples of our schools that are connecting to our First Nations and Aboriginal Communities bringing role models into classrooms on a regular basis. It is only December and we have had 182 presentations in classrooms and school assemblies. Presentations range from Indigenous plant walks, traditional 'Tuesday Tea' talks, Métis Enhancement Project presentations, environmental talks, treaty talks and current topics related to our communities and families.

The Family Fall Gathering has been a highlight for our school district on September 25th at Scia'new Nation LLong House. The theme of the night was to honour our role models that volunteer to present in our schools. We have over 90 role models in our departments' Role Model Binder resource! Our school district was very honoured to be invited to the Long House by Scia'new Nation to guide us

through a protocol best suited for a family and school event. In addition, the nation gave the school district permission to share photos of the event. The evening began with traditional welcome by Elder Lavina Charles and Elder Shirley Alphonse and speaker protocols with Rick Peters. One representation from each nation were asked to be witnesses: Elder Burt Charles, Elder Jack Planes, Tara Munro and school district Dave Betts. Our hosts, the Charles family provided a wonderful feast with sixty smoked fish donated by T'Sou-ke Nation. Yellow Wolf Singers welcomed the role models with an honour song. The role models were called up to the centre by Scott Sam, OCM and the each role model was blanketed and words of wisdom shared to each individual by community leader, Chief Russell Chipps. Each red blanket has our department logo and a piece of cedar provided by Henry Chipps. The Tzinquaw Dancers also provided an honour song and dance for all to embrace. Our evening ended with witness speech, friendship dance and an apple treat to go. Congrats to the department's committee, Sharlene Chaves, Sharon Bond, Murielle Lagace, Earleen Covey, Shirley Alphonse and Michelle Thut, for the hard work bringing community and family together.

Our school district has recently signed two LEAs with T'Sou-ke Nation and Pacheedaht Nation. Local Education Agreement, LEA are district level documents that set goals and strategies that support improved First Nation student outcomes.

In support of Aboriginal outcomes the school district would like to thank our partner group Makola Group of Societies for the generous donation toward our grade twelve and adult recognition ceremony. Our year end ceremony grows every year as more and more students graduate.

In support of keeping warm we would like to thank 'Knights of Columbus Coat Program' for donating colourful coats for our department to distribute. And perfect timing as temperatures in December neared -8C and snow was to be enjoyed!

As I read the newsletter submissions by the Aboriginal Education department I am intrigued and invigorated by the diverse services found in schools, and initiatives grow every year; as we strive for safe, cultural responsive, happy, and engaging schools in 2014. Enjoy!



PORT RENFREW ELEMENTARY

The Port Renfrew Elementary start up this year has been inspiring. As I sit here reflecting on the last few months, it brings back memories of an opening pancake breakfast full of community spirit, our new little drumming circle making beautiful music on the rug, First Nations art and music projects that line the hall of the school, walks down to the local park for exploration, fun, and fitness, fishing with the Pacheedaht First Nation on Community Fishing Day, the Community Club gatherings at the new Pacheedaht Health Centre, and much more. I have to say that our busy little class has been on some pretty wonderful adventures, both in and out of the classroom, so far this year.

I have the privilege to work with the Port Renfrew Elementary School K-5 students on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings this year. On Mondays, I spend my time supporting literacy in the classroom with Shannon MacDonald and introducing as many Aboriginal stories, songs, games, art activities, and poems that I can muster. In the next few months, you'll find more and more role models will be working with the students on Mondays, developing a richer and deeper understanding of the First Nations, particularly the Pacheedaht people. I'm so excited about it that I can't wait to tell you more about it in our next newsletter. On Tuesdays, I offer more literacy support with a First Nations story, Words Their Way, reading, and journaling practice. On Wednesdays we finish off our Words Their Way for the week, have another First Nations poem or story and move into our Talking Tables groups. You'll notice that there's a lot of reading, listening for comprehension, and journaling in the program. I have found that the more students practice these skills, the more literate and confident they become. My goal, over the next few months, is to

increase each student's reading and writing levels. I am hopeful that the parents will all continue to read, read, and read some more with their children at home. Aside from all of the amazing classroom work the students have already accomplished, we have made a few exciting trips outside of the school and into the community of Port

Renfrew.

On one particularly cloudy day in September, our class ventured across the small bridge in Port Renfrew and met the Pacheedaht Community for Fishing Day. As Shannon, Laurie, and I sorted out and secured the life jackets on the students, they wiggled and giggled their way into the power boat beached on the riverside. Clinging onto the side of the boat, we glided up river to a tiny island in the middle of the river. We jumped and splashed our way into the deeper grass and watched as the elders showed us how to spread the nets. The students learned the fine art of patience as we watched the community move nets off of snags and move the fish into the nets. It was quite moving how curious about everything they all were. When it finally came time to pull in the nets, all of the children eagerly grabbed a spot on the ropes and pulled with all of their might. As the fish came up and out of the water, the children smiled from ear to ear. We only caught eight fish, but you'd think we had won the lottery. As the fish were laid out in front of the children, they had some fun trying to figure out what each fish was named and took turns holding the fish. We paused for a moment to talk about respecting fish and the environment along with it. All in all, the day was very successful. We may not have caught many fish that day, but we certainly grabbed all of their imaginations and taught them about patience and the beauty of community.

On another fine October afternoon, we journeyed down to the new Pacheedaht Health Centre for Community Club. Amanda, a Port Renfrew Firefighter and mother of one of our students. took the time to teach the children all about her different duties as a firefighter. She read a story, talked about fire safety, identified each piece of equipment she uses and how it works, allowed the children to try on the outfits, let them race to see who could get dressed fastest, showed us how she can lift very heavy objects quite easily to help people (yes....we all took turns being lifted high up in the air), ate a healthy lunch, did a craft, practiced



stop, drop, and roll for prizes, and spent time wandering around and in the fire truck. The children particularly liked it when the

horn was beeped and the fire engine parts opened and closed. All in all, the children saw the humanity in Amanda, and that in itself is worth a million. Perhaps now they won't be as scared if they should ever need her help in an emergency.

At the beginning of November, we ventured down to the new Pacheedaht Health Centre for Community Club again. *Continued on next page....*

On this particular day, the VIHA nurses came down to teach us about healthy eating choices and diabetes. The children seemed truly surprised by how many sugar and salt packages came with some of their favorite meals. Frankly, there was quite a bit of heading shaking among all of us. I think this was a really relevant/practical learning experience for everybody. We then ate a healthy lunch together, read a story, created poppies for Remembrance Day, and played food identification bingo for prizes. Everyone, as usual, left happy with a full belly, new things learned, and a gift to share with their family at home. Many of the children took home a music cd full of traditional Aboriginal music. I hope they all loved it!

It's now getting late into November and the children are learning to drum in a circle, getting ready to make a trip to John Muir for Transition Days and swimming, and are already talking about Christmas and parties. The Port Renfrew Elementary School, StrongStart, & Pacheedaht Preschool Christmas Celebration, in fact, it's coming up on Wednesday, December 11, 2013 at 12 noon. Let the baking and crafting begin.

SASEENOS ELEMENTARY

students about what they have on paper as we scribe their stories for them. Another highpoint in kindergarten includes a visit from our Aboriginal Education Role Model, Jeff Welch. Thank you for coming in to drum with the kindergarten class Jeff! Who knew making music could be so much fun? Hych'ka to Saseenos for such a great start to the school year! class, and are done so through teamteaching services within a mainstream classroom.

Here we are again off to another school year. I'm happy to be back for my third year at Sangster, Happy to see returning students and staff. This year I'm here two days week Tuesday and Wednesday. I've gotten myself into a regular routine amidst the construction going on here, which is for the better.

Tuesday I'm here for my first year with the Nature Kindergarten class, which is amazingly awesome! In the morning we as a class go out to the Royal Roads University forest to study everything about the forest, the kids learn about the trees, wildlife, plants, and the general surroundings. In the afternoon they are read a story, then we talk and write about what they have learned about in the forest, then they have centers for the remainder of the day. I work with two amazing teachers, and have four Aboriginal students in this class. Both staff and students welcomed me with open arms. Together we all have learned a lot and I'm anxious to learn even more in the near future. It has been arranged for Shirley Alphonse to come into this class to welcome and do a territory acknowledgement with another local role model from the territory we are on. We have also had Earl Claxton Jr., and John Bradley Williams, accompany us into the forest and explain some of the cultural uses of the forest, and to tell us some legend stories. Jeff Welch came in for a second appearance to do a drumming presentation, and explain how the drum is made. He did a stunning job with the class. Another role model came to do a carving demonstration and show us some of the things he has carved out of the cedar tree. The kids were amazed with the artifacts he presented. Andre Spencer came to the class to tell some legend stories from an eastern point of view. He told us about the bear, the wolf, and the covote tale. For the future we as a class group look to learn even more about the Aboriginal background of the forest with our future Aboriginal

role models.

On Wednesdays I have gotten myself settled into a routine of going into the student's classroom and giving them academic support. I help in language arts, math, reading, science, and spelling.

For Aboriginal role models they have carried over from the Nature K class. I have brought in Earl, and John. They have come to the grade five and one class, Murray Campbell has come to the grade one class, Jeff Welch has come to a class. Andre Spencer has returned to tell his stories to a class. For the near future I have talked to role models about coming and doing a presentation for some other classes. I'm looking forward to it!

They will be hosted by the LE, NONET mentor students.

We began the fall, with a visit from Pakki Chipps, an Elder from the Scia'new Nation who provided valuable information about traditional uses of plants during her nature walks and presentations. With our new approach of supporting students in their classroom we have had the chance to assist and witness the amount of First Nations culture being introduced and encouraged by the teachers.

During the past several weeks, we have been leading an Aboriginal art exploratory that involve drawing basic ovoid's and u shapes that progressed into drawing animals on a canvas. Spencer Middle School – Winter Newsletter Submission

As the school year began in the CENQOLEW moon, during the arrival of the dog salmon, Nadine and I had to adapt quickly in familiarizing ourselves with a new space at Spencer Middle School. With the All Nations Room changing locations, lots of organization and cleansing transpired. After cleansing the room, we hosted the first of many speakers luncheons with traditional fruit and tea. Following the lunch bell, staff and students united in the All Nations Room to see Alpha Solong, indigenous to Vanuatu, who spoke about his not-for-profit organization Wan Smolbag, the importance of hip hop and the work they do with youth. A very empowering presentation enjoyed by all. Hych'ka Alpha for your time, energy, and dance moves! In First Nations Exploratory, both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students became acquainted with new ways of teaching and learning through the powerful sharing circle.

Though at times, challenging, students grew with insight and inquiry as they became engaged in Aboriginal ways of knowing by investigating the 13 Moons of the WSANEC, practicing SENCOTEN words, baking bannock (fry bread), and viewing the world through a different lens.

Frost began to appear on the grass as we transitioned into the next moon, PEKELANEW, the moon that turns the leaves white. To begin their learning on First Nations history, my Socials 9 class partook in an opening circle and smudge led by Elder Shirley Alphonse. The experiential learning that occurred was valuable and eye-opening to many students. Aboriginal ways of knowing became weaved into the yearbook class as the design team decided on an Coast Salish theme this year, highlighting Spencer's connection to the land through Coast Salish art. Hych'ka Siem to Charlene George for her creations and guidance to the yearbook staff. The First Nations Exploratory invited international students attending Pearson College from Central, South America, the Middle East, and Africa who shared presentations about their country and its indigenous peoples. The exploratory concluded

with a culminating art and research project where students created a cedar frame painted in Coast Salish art form with a description and photo of their Aboriginal Hero. Some of these heroes included: Jordin Tootoo, Tom Longboat, Evan Beach, Maria Tallchief, Jessie Oonark, John Herrington, Tom Jackson, and Paul Okalik.

As the weather grew colder into WESELANEW, moon of the shaker leaves, more students joined the All Nations room at lunch for traditional tea and snacks. Appreciatively, many kind students look forward to their time of peace and rest with Nadine's soft, caring presence during their break. Classrooms became busy with role-models this moon, with Earl Claxton Jr. Jr. and John-Bradley Williams sharing their WSANEC culture and stories to Grade 7 classes. Hudson Webster presented with his daughter, Holly, on the history of the Nuu-chah-nulth culture, enjoyed by my Socials 9 class. Hudson performed a special drumming song while students enjoyed tasting bannock (fry bread). After all students had presented their First Peoples inquiry project, they were gifted with a special treat: a taste of 18foot hung cold-smoked Goldstream Chum salmon from Earl Claxton Jr. Jr.
